#### COUNTY COUNSEL'S IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS OF MEASURE A

ANALYSIS BY THE COUNTY COUNSEL FOR THE COUNTY OF ALAMEDA OF THE COUNTY OF ALAMEDA CHARTER AMENDMENT REGARDING THE NOTIFICATION PERIOD FOR CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS

The County of Alameda ("County") is a charter county. The County's charter governs certain county governmental functions. The County's charter can only be amended with voter approval.

One area that the County charter governs is civil service. Per the County's charter, the civil service has two categories of service positions: classified or unclassified. For classified positions, the County's Civil Service Commission, among other duties, must provide for the preparation and holding of competitive examinations to test the fitness of all applicants for appointment to or promotion in the classified positions.

The County charter section 36(b) currently requires the Commission to provide adequate notice but not less than 25 days' notice of each competitive examination to fill a classified position. Measure A seeks to amend section 36(b) by requiring adequate notice but not less than "14 calendar days" notice of each competitive examination.

If a majority of the electors voting on the Measure vote for approval, the County's charter will be amended as described above. If the majority of electors do not vote for approval, the Measure will fail, and section 36(b)'s notice period will stay the same.

This Measure is placed on the ballot by the County's Board of Supervisors.

#### ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF MEASURE A

In a bid to modernize its hiring practices and stay competitive in the Bay Area job market, the County of Alameda (County) proposes Measure A. The current 25-day job announcement posting requirement has proven counterproductive, impeding the County's ability to swiftly attract and hire top-tier candidates.

The extended 25-day posting period puts the County at a disadvantage in the competitive job market, leading to the loss of potential candidates actively sought after by other jurisdictions. Recognizing the urgency of adapting to contemporary trends, Measure A proposes a reduction in the posting duration from 25 to 14 calendar days.

Contemporary recruitment methods, such as social media and online platforms, have revolutionized the dissemination of job announcements and streamlined application processes. The existing 25-day posting requirement is outdated, failing to effectively engage the desired candidate pool.

Approving Measure A is not just an adjustment in policy; it is a strategic move to align recruitment strategies with modern practices. In the face of low unemployment rates and heightened competition for qualified candidates, this amendment helps to ensure the County remains a competitive employer.

By voting in favor of Measure A, you support a crucial step towards optimizing recruitment and hiring processes. This positive change is about more than just reducing the number of posting days; it is about creating an agile, responsive recruitment system that meets the expectations of today's workforce. 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### Rebuttal to Argument in Favor of Measure A

The independence, professionalism, and integrity of Alameda County's government workforce are under attack!

Alameda County's civil service system supposedly hires and promotes County employees based on <u>merit</u> and <u>equal</u> <u>opportunity</u>. It allegedly <u>protects employees from political interference</u> from the Alameda County Board of Supervisors.

Instead of addressing the *serious*, longstanding problems about <u>Supervisors' political</u> <u>meddling</u> with Alameda County's civil servants uncovered by Alameda County's Grand Jury, Supervisors placed Measure A on the ballot.

Measure A would reduce the time period that County job announcements are posted for potential candidates to learn about openings and apply, from 25 days down to just 14.

In 1966, Alameda County voters amended County Charter Section 36 to set the current 25-day job announcement posting requirement. Before that **Equal Employment Opportunity reform**, Alameda County's civil service had a shorter job announcement posting period (just ten days). That was **too short** for candidates to learn about the existence of job openings and to apply.

Until 1966, that old system favored "internal" candidates who already worked for Alameda County government and had inside information about job openings. That discriminated against "external" candidates, especially Blacks, Hispanics, Asians, and women, who were underrepresented in Alameda County's workforce.

By the time "outsiders" learned about job announcements, it was too late to apply. By default, the "good ole boys" with inside information received County jobs and promotions.

Measure A would swing Alameda County back towards that pre-1960s system of favoring "insiders" and keeping out "external" candidates from County jobs.

Send Alameda County Supervisors a message for better, cleaner government. Vote NO.

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### In 2015, the Alameda County Grand Jury issued these findings:



- "There was unethical and persistent interference by a supervisor's chief of staff which Voters
  compromised the county's integrity and improperly influenced staff decisions regarding land
  use, resulting in wasted county resources."
- "Multiple department heads and county staff were unable to perform their duties in a fair and consistent manner due to political interference."
- "The Alameda County Board of Supervisors directly participates in hiring and reviewing department heads, which creates a culture where political interference is allowed to permeate the day-to-day administration of county business."

In response, the 2015 Grand Jury made these recommendations:

- "The Alameda County Board of Supervisors must adopt a code of ethics policy covering all county employees."
- "The Alameda County Board of Supervisors must adopt an anti-interference policy to ensure elected officials and their staffs do not inappropriately influence the administrative responsibilities of county staff."
- "The Alameda County Board of Supervisors must take steps to have the county charter amended to relinquish its control of hiring of non-elected department heads to the county administrator."

But nine years later, the Board of Supervisors has FAILED to implement <u>ANY</u> of the Grand Jury's recommendations.

The 2023 Alameda County Grand Jury criticized Supervisors' inaction: "Alameda County Needs a Code of Ethical Conduct and Whistleblower Program ... Despite repeated findings from prior Grand Juries on ethical violations, and a specific recommendation to establish an ethics policy and reporting mechanism in 2015, the Board of Supervisors has not acted for nearly a decade."

Instead Supervisors offer Measure A, a meaningless proposal that fails to address the Grand Jury's longstanding, well-founded concerns.

We want serious ethics reforms to protect Alameda County's civil servants from political interference. Alameda County also needs a **lobbyist registration** ordinance, like other California counties have. **Send a message to Supervisors.** 

Full text of C	County of	Alameda	Measure	

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This Measure \_ will become effective only if submitted to the voters at the election held on March 5, 2024, and only after approval by a majority of the qualified voters voting in the election on the issue.

The Charter Amendment will take effect as provided for in sections 23713, 23714, and 23724 of the Government Code.

Section 36(b) of the Charter of the County of Alameda shall be amended to read as follows [by adding the underlined and deleting the struck-out material]:

Sec. 36: It shall be the duty of the Civil Service Commission:

- (a) To provide for the classification of all positions in the classified Civil Service and from time to time for the reclassification of any or all such positions and for the allocation and reallocation of individual positions to classes in such manner as to permit and encourage the filling of higher classes by promotion. In the performance of such duty, the Commission shall be guided by the principles presently set forth in Section 18,801 of the Government Code of the State of California. Each such action of the Commission shall be submitted to the Board of Supervisors and shall become effective upon approval by said Board.
- (b) To provide for the preparation and holding of competitive examinations in order to test the relative fitness of all applicants for appointment to or promotion in the classified Civil Service; provided, however, that noncompetitive qualifying examinations may be given to incumbents with tenure in positions which are reclassified or reallocated, and that the name of each incumbent who qualifies in such qualifying examination shall be placed on an eligible list and the said incumbent shall be appointed subject to probation to the reclassified or reallocated position, anything in this Charter to the contrary notwithstanding. Adequate notice but not less than twenty-five 14 calendar days notice shall be given of each competitive examination.
- (c) To provide a period of probation for each class in the classified civil service before appointment or promotion is complete, during which period a probationer may be discharged or reduced. Each such action of the Commission shall be submitted to the Board of Supervisors and shall become effective upon approval by said Board.
- (d) To examine the payrolls of all employees in the classified civil service and the County Auditor shall not pay or approve any payment of salaries to such persons unless there appears on the payroll therefore, a certification by the Commission that the persons named thereon have been appointed to their respective positions in accordance with the provisions of this Charter.
- (e) To recommend to the Board of Supervisors at least sixty days prior to the end of each fiscal year a rate of pay for each class in the classified civil service based upon a comparison of salaries being paid for like service and working conditions in other comparable places of public and private employment in order that all salaries shall be uniform for like service in each class of the classified civil service.
